Pre-Trip Session 1: Connect

Welcome, Introductions and Opening Prayer

5 minutes

Get creative with your team and build some good energy and excitement for the team by sharing information about your group. How many members? Who has served before? Who is new to this experience? Do some research before this session to share a few fun facts about the Group Leaders and their favorite music, snack or verse from scripture.

Ice Breaker: Three In Our ASP Crowd

5-10 minutes

Have the large group split off into smaller groups of three and find three things in common (besides the obvious gender, color of clothing worn, school attended or hair/eye color) such as: favorite holiday, season of the year, hobby, phone app, movie, etc. One person then introduces the group and shares the three things they have in common. Depending on your group, you can make it a bit silly by asking the person who does the intro to use a voice like a talk-show host/sports commentator or famous musician. Bonus points for using a cool voice! Set a timer for 3 minutes for people to find their 3 and plan an intro. Allow each intro to be 1 minute. Adapt this to the size of your group.

1. According to the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), how many states are considered part of Appalachia? (5 states | 7 | 10 | 13 | 15)

The 13 states from southern New York to northern Mississippi are considered part of Appalachia.

2. This summer, ASP will serve families in how many Appalachian states? (1 state | 3 | 5 | 7 | 10)

5 states (Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia & West Virginia)

3. Why do ASP vehicles have names? (it's a tradition | it's funny | all ASP vehicles look alike | **all of the above**)

All of the above. The first vehicle donated to ASP, a station wagon nicknamed "Pinky" for its fading red paint, started the tradition. We've kept it up since then, plus it's more fun than saying "white van #3."

4. How many volunteers will serve with ASP during the Summer of 2025? (500 vols | 1,000 | 5,000 | **8,000**|**10,000** | 12,000)

This answer is still evolving! 8,000- 10,000 are expected this summer, as of February 2025, 8,300 have registered!

5. Who founded ASP? (Melisa Winburn | Mrs. Mary Ellen Evans | **Rev. Glenn "Tex" Evans**| Rev. Walter Crouch.)

ASP was founded by Rev. Glenn "Tex" Evans, a United Methodist minister. During Tex's 13 years serving Henderson Settlement in Frakes, Kentucky, he witnessed the great need for home repair assistance for Appalachian people. As part of his already-thriving outreach, he recruited 50 teen and adult volunteers to repair homes in Barbourville, Kentucky in the summer of 1969 and ASP was born.

6. What year was ASP founded? (1954 | **1969** | 1982 | 1995 | 2013)

1969 – were you paying attention to the last question?



7. Which subregion of Appalachia has the lowest median household income? (North | North Central | **Central** | South Central | Southern)

In Central Appalachia, the median household income is \$34,628 which is 38 percent less than the national figure. (From an Appalachia Regional Commission paper 2021.)

Bonus questions! What did ASP's founder like to say about ASP & how we interact with peopl, which has become one of our Guiding Principles?

"We accept people right where they are, just the way they are."

How did ASP's founder describe ASP?

"ASP is a relationship ministry with a little construction on the side." Servant Leadership exercise (from 1990 EG on New Ways to Serve.)

Guiding Principles Discussion



Group leader instructions: Divide your group into small groups of 5-7 people, share this discussion guide with them (pages 4-5.) Ask small groups to read each Guiding Principle and take a few minutes to discuss the questions attached to each principle. Be aware that if you want to get through all seven, you can only spend a few minutes on each. You may also assign 1 or 2 Guiding Principles to each small group, give them 10 minutes to talk together and then come back and share with the entire group.

We believe that each person is a child of God imbued with dignity and worth.

- Genesis 1:27a So God created mankind in his own image, / In the image of God he created them[.]
- John 3:16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.
- Discussion question: How is the work you will be doing this summer building up the dignity and worth of those around you?

- Romans 15:5-7 May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Jesus Christ had, so that with one mind and one voice you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God.
- Discussion question: How does accepting those around you bring praise to God? Do you think that holding in mind the intention to give glory and honor to God might make it easier to accept someone you'd otherwise have a hard time accepting?



- Discussion question: In this passage, it's clear that part of God's intention to bless God's people is the safety and stability of a home. What can you do to help provide or push for the blessing of a home for those without?

- Discussion question: Have you ever considered good stewardship as "witnessing- or sharing your faith" before? Does taking that into account change how you feel about your stewardship and the quality of your work?

These 3 things might be information about your group's fundraising, deadlines for forms and payments, dates for your next meeting, whatever the most important 3 things are for YOUR group to know.


Sending Prayer: Franciscan Blessing
